#### **DEAR FRIENDS,**

Last year was exceptional, one marked by success and growth. Registrations for our afterschool programs hit all-time highs. JANS Winter Welcome, our annual fundraising gala raised record funds for our Youth Sports Alliance's (YSA) afterschool programs, partner winter sport teams and scholarships for junior athletes. Yet, these milestones are just a few of the many highlights that defined our year.

- Our message of providing life-changing access to sport was heard on the world stage, underscoring our vital role in the Olympic legacy. Emily Fisher, YSA Executive Director, joined the official SLC-UT Committee for the Games delegation in Paris, along with two YSA athletes. All were present for Utah's final presentation to the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and during the subsequent IOC voting.
- The President's Council on Sports, Fitness & Nutrition recognized us with the Community Leadership Award. Heather Sims, Programs Director, traveled to Washington, DC, to accept this award on behalf of YSA. The awards honor those who promote physical activity, fitness, sports, or nutrition and contribute to building more vibrant and thriving communities.
- YSA's program registrations grew by 25% this past year to 3231 experiences. When we
  launched our programming in Wasatch County in 2020, we didn't realize the incredible
  growth that this initiative would spark. Over the past five years, they've grown to 36% of our
  program registrants.

As we reflect on these achievements, we are humbled and grateful for the ongoing support from our community. Your belief in our mission to get all kids outside, active, and engaged is what makes these successes possible. This past year's growth not only represents more children served but also a stronger, healthier, and more inclusive community.

We look forward to continuing this journey with you, building on this momentum to create even more life-changing opportunities for youth in the year ahead. Thank you for being an essential part of the Youth Sports Alliance family.

### WHAT **IS** THE YOUTH SPORTS ALLIANCE?



The **VISION** of the YSA is to provide life-changing access to sport for the next generation.



The Youth Sports Alliance (YSA) was established in the wake of the 2002 Salt Lake City Olympics to increase the number of children participating in sports in Utah, utilizing the venues built for the Games. Since then, YSA has introduced thousands of kids to sport and healthy screen free activities through its afterschool programs, and raised millions of dollars to support area winter sport clubs. YSA encourages participation by offering need-based scholarships to students registering for our afterschool programs and to athletes training with our partner winter sport clubs.

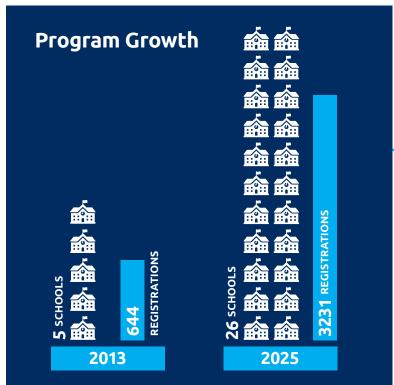
YSA runs afterschool programs introducing kids to sport and healthy screen free activities. Our programs are unique because we offer lessons, transportation and proper gear so all students can participate. Last year, we offered 184 sessions of affordable afterschool programs. Evidence shows that active kids are more likely to succeed in life – physically, emotionally, socially, and financially. We work to bring these benefits to all children regardless of their finances, gender, race or abilities.

70% of Park City students participate in one of more YSA programs while in elementary school.

41% of our students receive financial assistance to participate, including need-based scholarships and discounts for siblings and children of school employees and first responders. YSA provides full scholarships to students on the federal free and reduced lunch program and half-scholarships to students living in families who earn up to 80% of the area median income.









#### **GET OUT & PLAY**

GET OUT & PLAY (GO&P) At the elementary school level, YSA provides access to affordable group sport lessons. Offerings include a wide range of activities such as skiing, ice skating, mountain biking, golf and more to keep kids active while providing afterschool supervision.



#### **ACTIV8**

Middle and junior high school students are offered introductory sport classes, as well as healthy activities designed to get students off their screens. A decade ago, YSA pioneered middle school and junior high afterschool programming on the Wasatch Back in conjunction with school administrators, students and community members to offer engaging programming for older ages such as biathlon, sailing, and photography.

### YSA HONORED WITH PRESIDENTIAL AWARD

The Youth Sports Alliance was honored with the Community Leadership Award from the President's Council on Sports, Fitness & Nutrition. Heather Sims, accepted the award in Washington, DC, on behalf of the team. This award celebrates those who build thriving communities through sports, fitness, and nutrition, promoting well-being and supporting the potential of all community members.





#### LEARNING TO LEAD THROUGH SPORT

When Kenia's mom first signed her up for an ice skating class in elementary school, neither of them knew what to expect. Kenia quickly discovered that skinny blades on slippery ice meant lots of falling—but she also learned how to get back up. That early lesson in resilience became a foundation she carried into every part of her life.



Since that first class, Kenia has participated in a wide range of YSA afterschool programs. Along the way, she embraced the joy of snowboarding, discovered how to balance patience and speed through biathlon, found inspiration in nature while sailing, and unlocked her creativity and problem-solving skills in pottery. She credits these experiences with helping her succeed in school and better connect with her peers.

"All these skills have helped me face challenges I was never taught how to overcome," says Kenia. "But I learned how to figure things out in my own way."

This year, Kenia will serve as a Captain on the Park City High School Mountain Bike Team. A standout athlete, she earned the leader's jersey in her race category last season. She credits her growth into this leadership role to the confidence and skills she gained through years of participating in YSA programs.

#### Funding Our Seven Partner Winter Sports Teams:

\$185,950 in need-based training funds were distributed to 124 athletes training with 7 YSA-member teams during the 2024-25 season.



\$347,717 raised for YSAaffiliated winter sports teams through JANS Winter Welcome.

\$264,000 raised for needbased scholarships awarded through the Stein Eriksen YSA Opportunity Endowment.

#### ATHLETE PROFILE: Kate Pressgrove, Age 17, Figure Skating Club of Park City

Kate Pressgrove took her first skating lesson at two and a half, embarking on a journey that has impacted her life on and off the ice. A member of the Figure Skating Club of Park City (FSCPC), Kate rose to become one of the country's top-ranked skaters. She was the first FSCPC skater to get named to U.S. Figure Skating"s High Performance Development Team, and in 2022, she received the prestigious Mabel Fairbanks Skatingly Yours Developmental Award, honoring promising BIPOC figure skaters.



Kate was adopted as an infant by a single mother, Lisa, a neonatal ICU nurse. Lisa worked long shifts, yet stepped up to run her girl scout troop and volunteered countless hours

to support FSCPC. Through the demands of the sport and the example set by her mother, Kate learned perseverance and hard work. On days her mom works, Kate gets up at 4:30 AM for training, prepares breakfast, and drives to the rink. To help fund her training, Kate enters essay contests, raises livestock to sell at the county fair, and works as a junior skate instructor. But it was YSA's consistent financial assistance throughout Kate's entire skating career that made her training and competition possible.

Kate's inspiring story deeply resonated at JANS Winter Welcome last October. Her powerful narrative led to a record-breaking \$264,000 raised in the paddle raise—all directed to need-based scholarships for local winter sport athletes. During the 2024 Paris Games, Kate also represented YSA for the Salt Lake City-Utah Committee for the Games, joining Executive Director Emily Fisher in Paris for Utah's final presentation and the subsequent IOC voting.

Balancing rigorous academics with full-time training and work, Kate's perseverance has earned her admission to Dartmouth College's Class of 2029, where she plans to pursue her dream of becoming a surgeon and continue skating on their collegiate team.

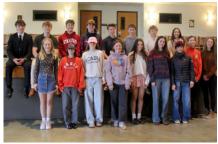

### YSA ON THE WORLD STAGE



Olympic Medals have been won by alumni of YSA-supported teams since the 2002 Games.



Park City's winter sports pipeline consistently produces the top athletes in the United States and the world. This year Park City's homegrown athletes continued to excel on the world stage.

In May of 2024, Park City
Nation saw 55 current or
alumni athletes of YSApartner winter sport teams
nominated to US national
or junior national teams.

Some highlights:



- 4 athletes first tried their sport through YSA's Get Out & Play elementary school program.
- 15 nominees received training funds from the Stein Eriksen YSA Opportunity Endowment.
- 17 athletes volunteered at JANS Winter Welcome, the primary fundraiser for many partner winter sports teams.



#### **ATHLETE PROFILE:** *Griffin Briley*

Griffin Briley, a Park City High School and Park City Ski & Snowboard alumnus, swept the individual, sprint, and vertical races, also securing a bronze in the mixed relay at the 2025 Ski Mountaineering (SkiMo) World Championships. This sport combines the grit of mountaineering with the exhilaration of skiing, demanding athletes to ascend steep, challenging terrain before descending at high speed on skis.

Griffin's journey in SkiMo began with a memorable ski tour alongside his dad, on a day that he remembers "the sky was super blue and the snow was sparkling." His deep connection to the mountains and his fierce drive echo that of his late mother, Emily, who loved the outdoors and instilled in him a resilient spirit.

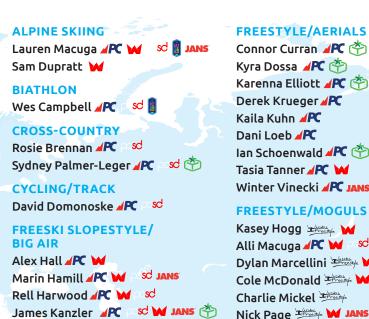

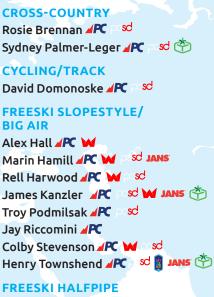

Early on, YSA was instrumental in "sparking my curiosity in the world of sports," Griffin notes, recalling his participation in Nordic skiing and ice skating through Get Out & Play. When he began to pursue SkiMo, funding from the Stein Eriksen YSA Opportunity Endowment provided help to "pursue and achieve my dreams." Briley, a longtime recipient of the Stein Eriksen YSA Opportunity Endowment (SEE), shared his compelling story at the 2023 JANS Winter Welcome, contributing to crucial endowment fundraising.

With his sights set on a future Olympics, Griffin is recognized as a rising star, even among older athletes. To compete at this elite level, international experience is vital. "YSA has helped Griffin get to Europe," his father notes, emphasizing that "SkiMo is in Europe and YSA has been huge in helping him get there."
